## The Pastor's Ponderings



I thought I would try something a little different this month and talk about the place for animals in our faith. Most of you know that I love animals – I have a cat, Samwise, and many of you met my dog, Charlie, before he died. I know that many of you also have animal companions or had them in the past. Animals are a big part of our life – whether it is livestock animals, pets, or wildlife. So, what does our faith teach us about animals?

One of the questions pastors will often get – especially from young people but it happens with people of all ages – is about what happens to our pets when they die. The difficult answer

to this question is that we don't really know. Scripture is (appropriately!) concerned with our own salvation and doesn't talk about the role of animals in heaven or in the promised New Creation when Jesus returns. There are those that believe that animals don't receive the promise of salvation because – unlike humans – they believe animals don't have a soul. That's something that – to be blunt – this pastor has some trouble believing.

Martin Luther and Tölpel: There are accounts of Luther's interaction with his dog who was named "Tölpel," which isn't a very flattering name (it means "fool" or "numskull" but it seems to have been a teasing name said in love). Tölpel was a beloved family pet and one of my favorite stories is when Luther looked at his dog who was begging at the supper table and said, "Oh, if I could only pray the way this dog watches the meat! All his thoughts are concentrated on the piece of meat. Otherwise he has no thought, wish, or hope." There is another story where Luther is described as looking at his dog and saying: "Be thou comforted, little dog, Thou too in Resurrection shall have a little golden tail." While I can't say that scripture tells us dogs will share in the glory of the resurrection with us, that Martin Luther believed they would!

We also get some great information about animals in the story of creation:

Genesis 1: Human beings are given stewardship (or "dominion") of animals but I think that's only part of what we ought to learn from the story of creation. Notice first that God's initial intention was to create a world where animals and humans ate plants alone. "... every green plant for food." When creating the animals, God also called the creation "very good."

The creation was called "very good" before humanity was on the scene. That tells me that the animals are a part of the "good creation" and not only "good" because they are useful to humans.

Food Choices: As people who have stewardship of the animal kingdom, it's our job to safeguard it. As I was doing some reading on this topic, I discovered a movement within Christianity that claims Christians should choose vegan or vegetarian diets because to do otherwise would be to harm God's Creation. I'll admit this cheeseburger-loving pastor pushed back at that a bit and I'm not guite sure God is calling us to live in that way. I do think, however, that if we choose to eat meat and animal products, we can be better stewards of God's creation by calling for humane conditions for livestock animals and more humane meat production. Can you purchase from smaller producers or from cooperatives that have a high standard of animal welfare? Can you purchase seafood from companies that promise to harvest sustainably? It's wise to remember that we have the food we do because God grants us stewardship over animals and plants - and to be grateful for that specifically.

The Wild Beasts Describe God: Scripture mentions animals many times in many different ways. You may remember that Jesus told the disciples that God knows when even a sparrow falls to the ground (Matthew 10) and reminds us that we are worth more than many sparrows. The prophet Isaiah illustrates the peace that comes with the promised Messiah by saying, "The wolf shall live with the lamb; the leopard shall lie down with the kid; the calf and the lion will feed together, and a little child shall lead them. The cow and the bear shall graze; their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox." God's nature is clearly illustrated through animals.

There are so many more examples of how animals can be a part of our life of faith. What are some that you can think of?
